

The Complete Turf Care Guide

Practical artificial grass maintenance from Emerald Turf & Design

Save this guide for seasonal cleanup, routine care, and when to call a professional.

Artificial turf is designed to remove the weekly mowing, watering, and fertilizing cycle—but a few simple habits help it continue looking clean, upright, and ready to use. This guide covers the practical care most homeowners can manage, plus the situations where a professional inspection is a better call.

0.1 A simple routine goes a long way

For a typical residential yard, start with a visual walk-through every few weeks. Remove leaves, branches, and furniture debris before they become compacted into the fibers. Use a leaf blower on a low setting or a plastic rake; avoid sharp metal tools that can catch seams or backing.

If the area receives regular foot traffic, brush the turf against the fiber direction periodically. A stiff synthetic-bristle broom or turf rake lifts fibers that have settled under furniture, play equipment, and commonly used paths. The right cadence depends on use: a quiet side yard may need only occasional attention, while a pet run or active family backyard benefits from more frequent brushing.

0.2 Rinsing and pet cleanup

Rinsing helps clear dust, pollen, and light surface debris. Use a standard garden hose as needed, particularly after dry spells or when a space is used frequently. If pets use the area, remove solid waste promptly and rinse the affected spot. For occasional odor concerns, use a cleaner formulated for synthetic turf and follow its directions carefully.

Avoid household chemicals that can discolor, damage, or leave residue on the fibers. If you are unsure whether a product is suitable, test it in an inconspicuous area first or ask us before applying it across the lawn.

0.3 Spills and stains

Address spills early. Blot liquids with a clean cloth rather than grinding them into the surface, then rinse with cool water. For many everyday food and drink spills, a small amount of mild dish soap mixed with water is enough. Rinse again afterward so no soap film remains.

Oil, paint, adhesive, or other stubborn materials deserve a more cautious approach. Do not use harsh solvents, abrasive tools, or heat without confirming that they are compatible with your turf. A quick call can prevent a small spill from becoming a larger repair.

0.4 Infill, seams, and high-use areas

Some installations use infill to support the fibers, improve stability, or meet the needs of a specific application. Over time, heavy-use areas may need an inspection or top-off. If fibers seem consistently flattened, if drainage changes, or if you see movement at an edge or seam, contact us for an assessment rather than trying to pull or glue the material yourself.

0.5 Seasonal care in the Tri-State area

During leaf-heavy seasons, clear organic material before it breaks down on the surface. In winter, use a plastic shovel or leaf blower for light snow removal and avoid sharp-edged metal tools. During very hot weather, turf can feel warmer than natural grass; shade, footwear, and a quick rinse can make the space more comfortable before use.

Keep open flames, grills, and heat sources well away from turf. Do not park vehicles on the surface unless the installation was specifically designed for that purpose.

0.6 What homeowners can handle—and when to call

Routine rinsing, light brushing, debris removal, and prompt spill care are suitable for most homeowners. Call us when you notice persistent odor, drainage concerns, lifted edges, seam separation, areas that no longer recover after brushing, or a stain you are not comfortable treating.
